11.	<b>Content of the course:</b> Introduction to Physics. Physical quantities and units of measure. Kinematics of the material point. Uniform linear and circular motion. Motion with uniform acceleration. Projectile motion. Dynamics. Newton's laws. Inertial and non-inertial reference frame. Interaction and laws for conservation of momentum and energy. Dynamics of rotational movement. Rigid body. Kinematics and dynamics of an absolutely rigid body. Fluids. Gravity, fluid statics. Dynamics of an ideal fluid. Viscosity. Oscillations. Simple harmonic periodic motion. Equation of periodic motion and its solution. Energy at periodic motion. Damped and forced oscillations. Resonance. Mechanical waves, wave equation and wave packet. Transverse and longitudinal waves (equation, propagation velocity and standing waves). Sound, ultrasound, vibration and noise. Doppler effect. State of matter. Energy Equity and Maxwell-Boltzmann Distribution. Ideal gas state equation. Heat, heat dissipation and heat transfer mechanisms (convection, thermal conductivity and radiation). Absolutely black body. Stefan-Boltzmann law. Thermodynamics. Work, heat and internal energy. First and second law of thermodynamics. Principle of operation and efficiency of heat machines and heat pumps. Entropy. Geometric optics. Fermat principle of light propagation. Basic laws in geometric optics. Optical instruments. Photometry. Photometric physical quantities, methods of their measurement and their application in modeling the illumination of surfaces and rooms. Modeling and simulation of physical phenomena.
